Dear Sir,

The day I left London being Sunday June
 of 7th instant and its services embraced and last night on my
 arrival here I spent June of 16th instant with the various letters
 and papers enclosed. I now enclose the regular true needs ac-
 counts as properly signed.

I understand the Directors had been at Derby for some day
 where they will continue for half on 30th Sept. from which
 day however keeping will regularly recommence and all the
 accounts be in attendance.

There cannot have been any objection to Ubbels' paying his
 mother a visit. I was some night in paying the half yearly
 Sum for the poor at Hampton Wick. I engaged the painter
 have done in the house and that all the drains in and about

The houses have been cleared out. I recollect in some of the
rooms the paper was to be destroyed and the tobacco being
very necessary in some places.

I am glad the harvest will be so soon completed. But winter
will be required for the harvest. I shall be glad to hear from
you twice a week before I leave this place. Our departure

is fixed for 10th Sept: after which I shall not write again
unless I should find letters from you at Ipswich for which
I have no intention to reach on 10th. I hope the second Fleet

will be at last to be at Ipswich. For the present I believe
I shall believe me,
