Last Sunday at Meiner. Received your  
 13  
 12<sup>th</sup> Aug: and was naturally surprised that I should  
 not then mention I returned here last night and now we  
 - know your letter and its various enclosures. In-  
 -terested the proper papers signed. The paper enclosed is being  
 in quietly if not usefully. I send a letter in my arre-  
 -re there from Judge announcing the accident you all-  
 -uded to in your letter. Thank God it needs no more. I  
 find it was the Guardsman who committed this act of  
 negligence.

As I have this place finally out of instant and shall be more  
 or less there on the same till I reach Derby it may not  
 be in my power to write again and direct I may not see.

-in any more letters or accounts from you. I have therefore  
 to state the Duke's proceedings with her as a person who will  
 afterwards in her life the name of His Majesty's Ambassador  
 her things are gone to Germany. In the meantime she is to  
 be in the King's Room from which date can be put up in  
 the adjoining Court for her own use and which I be-  
 lieve is impossible. In which case the Prince's must  
 be in the State Bed Chamber.

I make no doubt I shall find many things in good order  
 and I shall be most happy to find myself your own as  
 usual. Till then advice of I cannot write any more  
 and was believe me,
