 begin on the parts of the house.

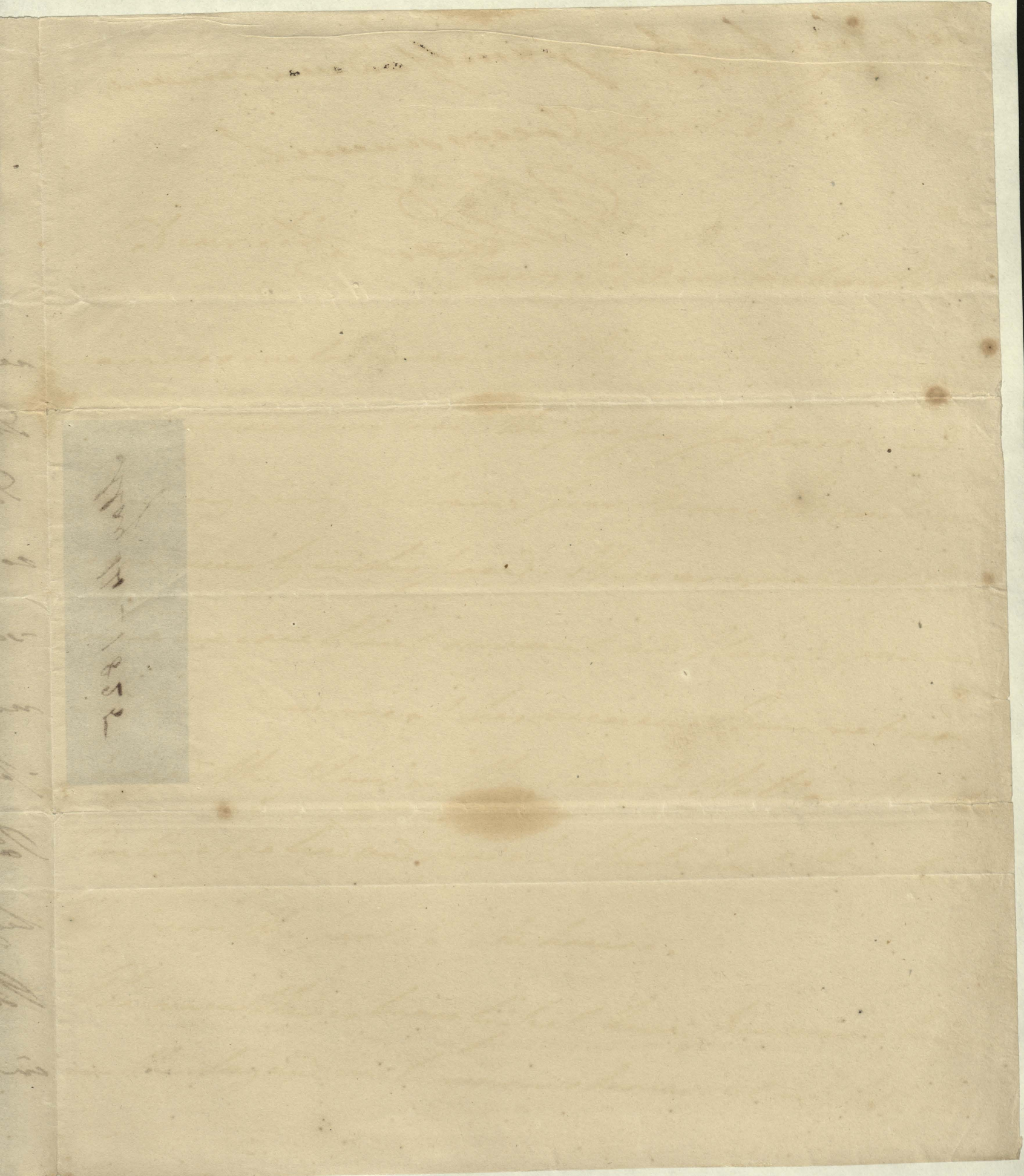
The weather is beautiful here; fine sun & breeze
