Dear Sir,

Your letter I have this morning
 received from George there appears some diffi-
 culty in forwarding my letters from England.
 I have not heard from you since 10th April and I must
 request you will regularly send up the Beechey
 accounts in as small a packet as you can make
 them in order to be forwarded by the Mail on
 this side of the water. The letters from the ser-
 -vants's wives at Beechey to their husbands
 cannot take up much room and may therefore
 come easier over to me.

We have had three weeks of the most beautiful
 weather: but since the day before yesterday
 absolute winter has returned.

Directed by the arrangements I shall make with
Buxton that during the remainder of my conti-
-nuance abroad there will not be any diffi-
-culty.

I have this instant received yours of 25th April
and rejoice the more that business is procurable
at Buxton. I pity poor Made and hope your next
account of Bennett will be of his being out
again. I do not recollect Mr: Josephson. I do
not know Brewer of Trillicken house: but the fel-
-low must have been a rascal. Mr: Whately
must have been a sad loss to her family. Adieu
