and therefore rejoice any part of the King's

-dom is quiet and wish the whole was tran-
-quil: but our government does not under-
-stand governing the country: what is the use
of power and laws if not put in force: I blame
the executive for allowing eight hundred
Quakers either in a protestant country or in
one which by law ought to be protestant.
my best wishes and compliments attend the
Quakers: I suppose at the meeting of Parlia-
-ment we shall meet: adieu and ever be-
-lieve me,
