Sir.

When Your c Majesty was so gracious some Years ago to grant me a sum of Money to pay my debts You asked me if that was the True state of my affairs, & I said Yes, with a good Conscience, for such it was that Lord Ailesbury stated it. But when Mathias received the Money, whom I am sorry to say was not consulted, He told me it would not pay all, ~~This~~ The thing was done & could not be altered, & after all the reductions being made by the advice of the latter, there are still some debts remaining which are very pressing. Unknown to me owing to the Intimacy between Mr Perceval & Mathias the former was spoke to by Him, & the moment I was informed of it I wrote a Letter to the Chancellor of the Exchequer desiring Him not to name it, as I was perfectly sensible that so many of the other Branches of the Family were

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more then in great distress; but as Mr M. had Spoken if You thin
He had now my leave to lay before Him the whole
state of my Affairs that He might be convinced
that it was not by any foolish gratification

I have desired Elyza to read You my Letter ^{to} ~~for~~ as it is out of my Power to speak for myself, & tho' I have the highest opinion of C. Taylor, I thought any thing between Y^r M^r & me was better to remain amongst Ourselves.

I will not detain Yr M^r any longer with such an unpleasant Epistle, but throw myself entirely upon yr goodness, being Convinced that You will always be just & kind to
