Dear Brother,

There I have been since Saturday and instead of examining there has been nothing but snow and rain. Of course am not in the way of knowing anything indeed. I have only seen Bradbyll and Cottin: the latter was all last week inspecting with General Fane & son: and says the whole conversation in that County was about the King's illness: the report there is that the insanity turns upon Catholic Emancipation in Ireland the name of Pitt and of Monastert.

our forces so scattered that the only two days I have
in the week to myself are the Monday and Saturday
I am anxious for the present to attend to the men in
case we should be wanted and shall therefore re-
main here for some time but of course nothing will
detain me whenever you may want me: as soon as
things are left me know and I shall always be
home in three or four hours.
