

Brunelles.
 Feb. 14. 1814.

Dear Sir,

I had attended yesterday at the great
 Cathedral the singing of the "Deum" which
 was beautiful and imposing: the weather was fa-
 vourable: the Duke of Saxe Weimar mounted on
 his whole suite and staff General Belou and all
 the Prussian Generals with their different Etat
 Major together with various guards of honours
 mounted including all nations and religions pre-
 sents to the Cathedral where we were received by
 the Catholic Clergy: we were six Princes in all:

the Church was lined with the fine second Regiment
of Grenadier Guards and their magnificent march
and drums: there were thousands collected: the sight
was most splendid and the elevation of the host with
the military honours and music was grand: we then
visited the Duke's Palace and myself have gained
great applause for my attention and respect to
the Catholic Religion: much has been said on the dif-
ference of the conduct of us three heretics from
that of the French authorities who are Catholics
attending on similar occasions: another division of
Pompian's marched in here yesterday and another
left it: but I cannot write the names of the fore-

-rally: more banners are also arrived: I admire the mag-
 -nan Infantry: I continue to receive the most flat-
 -tering attention from all the German and Prussian
 officers and am delighted in the manner in which
 both and indeed all nations speak of the Prince

Regent.

Yesterday received a letter from the Duke of Cam-
 -bridge of ^{the} 5 instant desiring me to proceed to Han-
 -over and at the same time the most surprising message
 from the Queen of Württemberg to visit her at
 Stuttgart: I wrote to both to say I should do the
 Prince Regent's directions: for the present will be
 directed by my brother to alter my destination I shall

interview with the Duke of Saxe Weimar who com-
mands the Russian Cossack and Saxon troops with
Polow: shall proceed, I hope with very advantage
to the great Head Quarters: the Duke desires me to
join with him and I cannot sufficiently express my
gratitude for all his kindness: Believe me dear
to Person on the Secret: if anything order
will write before we leave this: otherwise you
shall hear from me as circumstances arise: God
bless you and ever believe me.
