Nothing can have been more fortunate than my determination to return to our own headquarters: for as I was on the road back from Courmay to this place, I met the Commissaire bringing me the Commissaire the Prince de Saxe's commands to return: I set out tomorrow at daylight and intended reaching the Commissaire before he had remained with him one day or two and then proceeding to the Commissaire where I shall remain till Sunday the

birth of Frank: on that day, I shall not go  
I must to embark for England unless my love  
-ther wishes me to proceed either to Hannover or  
Stuttgart or any where else.

My letter, I have received from the messenger, I  
peruse with the deepest concern the Prince  
Duke has been ill: but both Prince & Duke  
and Prince, they assure me he is thank  
God quite well again:

My anxiousness to return the messenger as soon  
as possible to Lord Carnarvon, shall in my next  
substantiate on my journey's expedition, which

has been delightful. I enclose the old and original  
 Prussian March to which they marched as early  
 as 1740 and request you will give a packet to Ca-  
 mendish Woodhouse from his niece.

 daughter send her word I am well and ever be-  
 lieve me,
