Dear Sir,

I enclose the copies of the letters

I have this day written to the Emperors of Austria
and Prussia and to the King of Prussia which
I have dispatched under the care of Lord William

Pitt & Co. in order to arrive in one week or to return
immediately: he delivers these letters to the allied

Princes and carries one from me to Lord Castlereagh:

Flament cannot sail today: but the Impugnabile

and the Russian Frigate wanting many stores and
the necessary provision attending the Captain
having only this morning taken the command
nearly prevent my attempting till tomorrow
to sail:

I hope you will bear in mind the popularity
that must ensue to my brother wearing the grey
uniform and showing the Put and Arsenal of
Portsmouth to the allied American: I can assure
you the names of the Put are in remarkable
good humour nor ever were better disposed and
at this season of the year are not required for
the trade of the country: in short all the mer-
