Sir,

Being well acquainted with

 Sidmouth and Mr: Peel. I do this with the
 more confidence as except under the most
peculiar circumstances I never intend
 to make application to give your Majesty
 any trouble respecting what ought to come
 from the minister. But my intercession with

Mr. John has been for many years, privately and I
have the assurance of the immediate ser-
vants of the Queen in unison with my per-
-sonal knowledge of his sincere attachment
to the best of Sovereigns.

There I leave this case and rely on your Majesty's
-ty's kind consideration in receiving these pa-
-pers as a mere act of friendship towards
Mr. John Leicester from myself and not ever
wishing to have an answer as the measure
can only rest between the Sovereign and the
Minister.

I should be glad to see you and I should be glad
John to send such papers and I should be glad

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opportunity with equal pleasure and truth
to repeat again my full determination
to abide on all points unreservedly intru-
ding on Your Majesty.
