I find on my arrival here yours of ^{the} instant and
return as I shall always the Park Farm and
other accounts signed: the fruit sent to Mr. Barton
was all right: from Conacher must not be stored

I have perfect confidence in Colphick and Coates and
even in Allen with your inspection: your own gra-
sence with the Park being merely kept in order is
all I fear at present day: the Farm requires chan-
ging and draining and thus the Board of Works
will assist Coates respecting Cain's Wood: Coates will
explain to you the errors of surveying and the fences are

to be kept in order: you are in the entire possession
of my ideas respecting the House: the Journal is
as to the pleasure you wish to be kept as well as the
number of hands will permit: the Hitcher Journal
is to be carefully and heavily wrapped and the
House in South Adelley square supplied as much
as possible from these when at House keeping:
the rest to be sent after your own use and some indeed
given to the servants in Becky House: if you
want more instructions you shall have them:

Whatever request I must feel
leaving home I trust can be completely it will
be for my permanent good: I have de desired you
my papers to the Dutch papers with whom you are a great
patron to and who desires to be remembered: she
continues to give universal affection

I hope before the end of this week my poor daughter
 -ters will be comfortably and respectfully settled
 -ed in South Audley Square: I trust George is
 giving you as well as I wish him: you will favour
 me with much and I shall answer as regularly
 as I can and ever believe me,
