I am happy to hear & in my power to say that dear Amelia has had a great deal of good quiet sleep in the night much pain on the side at times but this has been the last night she has had for the last 10 days. Beams find her with the last much pain to day & inquired her leave to go out between 12 & one, yesterday notwithstanding the last night she had the night before she really passed a more comfortable day than she has done for the last week - my dear Mr. Paine after some consolation of a friend not able to comfort

herself - I can not but be desirous to
 see you very much more better
 than he expects to find her
 but as she changes as in the
 24 times I am assured of
 nothing you to much -
 I trust I shall be able by to borrow
 but to say when Dr. Pope thinks
