My Dear Madam,
Your kind letters afford me too much interest
and comfort to allow me to delay thanking you for that which I have received
this morning. — Although the continued Debility of dear Amelia
& the Pain which she suffers give me the truest concern, I have
been cheered by the concluding part of your letter of the 5th & the
postscript of the 6th which was certainly calculated to encourage
better hopes. The means contrived by Sir Henry Dade to enable
Amelia to breathe the Sea Air appears to have been very well
imagined, but as the Excursion still seems to be too great for
her natural strength, it has occurred to me that she might
be more equal Beneficial with less fatigue from being moved
to the Sea adjoining the Lodge, where a Tent might be
placed, & might submit, with security of her that I might
see & I am persuaded that there will be no Difficulty in
procuring an Office & Surgeon of convenient Dimensions
at Heymouth.
