much pain & sorrow - but I can not
enter into any particulars in
a letter, but I am quite sure

would think we are quite right
As to our blindness we have suffered
a painful great butting
& suffering rather himself, but
the news in a least disorder

state - Public affairs have been as in
 that water & really very bitter
 is in a situation of great
 difficulties. He came home to
