Bayreuth Post Oct 26 -
9. 1812

My dear Mr Adams's kind enquiries after
 my health & success my warmest thanks
 & I really can say I am much better
 within three last two days - I rejoice
 upon your return & am fondly
 more engaged - I am glad you have
 had your Brother & his Daughter
 with you, it must have been a
 great comfort - I am anxious
 we could be by us me to be -
 I wish Mr King will not be at
 Hanover before next week the
 De Witts are left here quite
 until the 17th - I wish will
 certainly go to see some at
 Hanover - The old Indienne died
 the 18 after a long illness and I

am happy to say I have attended her to
 the last she died in her arms and
 spared me her own health has not
 suffered from this fatigue & anxiety
 she had only felt all Eliza's kindness &
 attentions & has proved it by
 mentioning her name kindly in
 her Will which has gratified
 Eliza very much - The death of the
 old lady will not prevent her
 going to see the King - Augusta
 is with the Royal Delighted with
