

April the 22nd 1813
My dear Genl Adams
I received your kind letter
yesterday & am delighted
to find you are arrived
in town & I trust you
are well. As you say
you are ready to move I
am sure whenever I
please I can not hope
on the 25th / morning
you will meanly & trust
write to me again. At
the same time I
have my little
chance of seeing you
in what I will

comfort on that day
 as all my Brothers
 coming from some
 only for that day
 makes it impossible
 for me to refuse
 them as much of
 my charming society
 as they choose to have
 but my response
 is that you should
 come Saturday
 as that Sunday is
 the first of the
 year you have
 one hour a day

after dinner is to
 be at the table by
 six o'clock when
 you could stay until
 we tell it & then
 drink tea with
 Mrs. Pakenham on
 Sunday you might
 be in my room
 by 11 o'clock &
 so pass two hours
 with me before
 the Prince & part
 of my Brothers
 dinner - You then
 might come to me

any more extensive sleep
 & desire that they
 with Beckwith &
 have in attendance
 every day after
 dinner as we
 did at Longwood
 If you could stay
 one Sunday evening
 at least I might
 contrive to see you
 privately that day
 & if but inconvenient
 stay till Sunday
 morning - I will not
 call this a visit
 as I expect you

to come & see me
 for some days in
 your way down
 into Devonshire
 & I hope between then
 & then we may
 meet in either
 Devon or Dorset
 I have ordered an
 apartment to be
 got ready at the
 White Hart for
 Saturday & intend
 a dinner to be
 ready between 4 &
 5 in case you
 come as I propose
 By your Obedt^h Serv^t

at home for you to come
to sleep in case for
your health can often
for the doctor's
& a room for you
& Lucia to sit in
I shall never buy
enough to be ready
to please you with
to the north of the
evening at six o'clock
I shall not name
your evening at
all to Beckwith
till I receive your
answer to this
