

Windsor May 4th 1813.

My dear Mr. Adams

Throwing your attachment and affection for honest mining, you will I presume excuse my writing you a few lines to give you an account of her. I was happy to say that on my arrival here yesterday evening I had the satisfaction of finding her better than suspected. She had had but an indifferent night. However since she has been up she is certainly more comfortable and I trust that in a very few days she will be better. The excruciating which had been plaguing her for some time has totally disappeared, and I firmly believe that this sudden attack of fever & pain in her head which she was seized with on Saturday has more to do with her former complaint than the influenza. Indeed I hope that she will, or indeed has now got rid of the latter which is a very unpleasant

and therefore quest.

Seize this opportunity of expressing
at home my wishes the pleasure of seeing you
when I shall be at Windsor, I am now returning
to Paris, which will be tomorrow, I shall seize
the earliest opportunity of appearing before you in
person how sincerely I am,
