My dear Mr. Adams
 I must now to tell you that I find
 Mr. Bayley has been sent some
 letters from a friend of George's
 that says he is coming
 home soon undoubtedly —
 when I saw the Dr of George
 the other day I asked him
 if he had heard any thing

 after leaving him about
 nearly 10 years he had
 a perfect right to come
 home, as far as that
 as the S. L. was on the
 the Regiments & he had
 been got his leave from
 the General who commands

in that place without
 the smallest respect
 therefore if he is coming
 before about five o'clock
 about it I told him
 of the beautiful legs he had
