Bayswater, Duke St. Feb 22

My dear Mr. [unclear] - We have been detained  
 a fortnight longer at this place in  
 consequence of the Duke being confined  
 with a cold attended with fever and  
 sin thro' I believe is a remarkable  
 matter in the last two days that we  
 were off to some [unclear] - for I had  
 business to get done under the  
 Duke's care - The great & early  
 snows I have kept since his illness  
 & the heavy nearly out of doors -  
 has done me so much good  
 that my legs - are very much  
 better & as far as regards myself  
 I shall be quite sorry to leave  
 the country as my [unclear]

& Percy I have an excellent amusement,  
 Mr. Curzon had the first volume, in fact  
 Lady (Belmont) & two of the Duke's  
 Gentlemen in the same name his  
 sleep - In days I really was very un-  
 easy about leisure as he had to finish
