 elevated Situation in the conduct of
 its Affairs. I cannot think that if

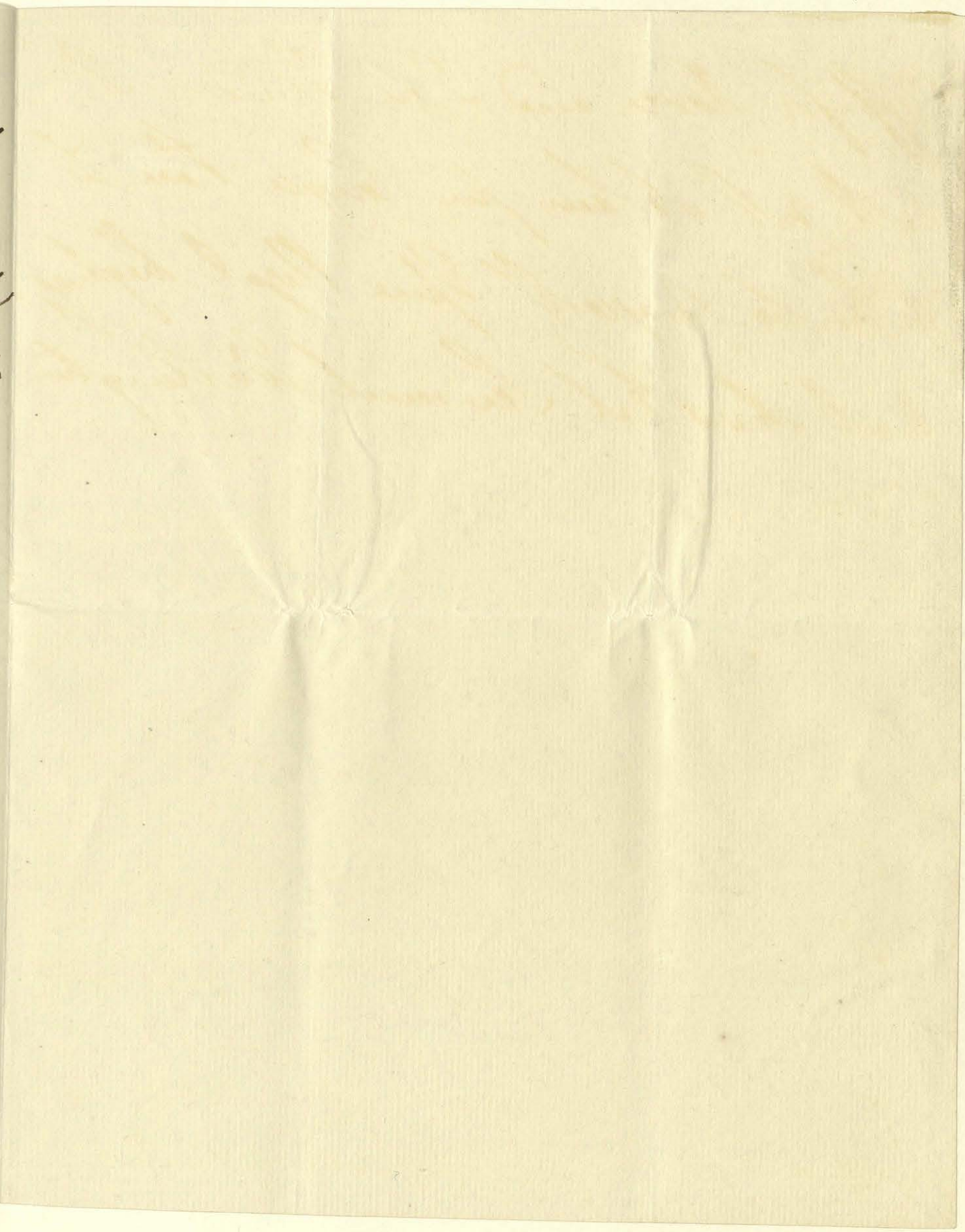
events should unfortunately occur
