Octbr 7th 1779

My dearest, dearest, dearest Sister, Friend,

I hope I need not express to you ye. pain I
felt upon parting with you, I think it was too strongly
painted in my eyes, for you to mistake my feelings. A
certain gloom upon yr. account attended me throout ye
day. We had charming Sport ay, I had been in
tip top spirits, as I am, when I know I shall see you
in ye. Afternoon, & recount to my friend yr. pleasures
of ye. day. I ha'v found it delightful. The
circumstances of a Chase are too trivial for me to
mention them to you, however there was one attending

ye. lode of 7 - which I am sure will give you infinite
pleasure. We first hunted one stag, which carried us
to Swindley. ^Which they there call S. Bateman's
Lodge - where we breakfasted, the stag having escaped
by leaping over a railing of 9 feet high as well
as a broad ditch. They then took out a second
stag from 150. common herd which they expected
will give us an hours labour or there abouts but
instead of which he ran three, & then dropped
this morning. but his life was saved & is now

lovely Miranda, pleaded strongly in his favor
& obtained his life. I believe I have established
my character among ye. Gentlemen of ye. Court
as a bold & good Trouserman, by keeping over a virg^r
tuous y^t Hodge & Hitch upon a descent, I havest
it according to y^t desire boasted of this to a song
