My Lord,

I have the honour to inform your Lordship, that the Intelligence I had the honour to communicate in my last despatch has been fully corroborated by some Gentlemen, who made their escape from the Eyder: the French Govt. have bought up Four thousand Lasts (Forty-four thousand Quarters) of Grain in the neighbourhood of Hamburg, which is now loading in the Elbe with ship timber for Holland. A Detachment of His Mys. Squadron on this Station is endeavouring to intercept the vessels at the mouth of the Elbe, but I fear from their drawing only four feet water they will be able to elude their vigilance.

the only point where any body of troops
are collected in this vicinity is by reports
exaggerated to eighteen thousand men,
but I have reason not to estimate it
more than ten thousand, and these
chiefly conscripts, if it even amounts

ments in some instances not even
exceeding a single company.






