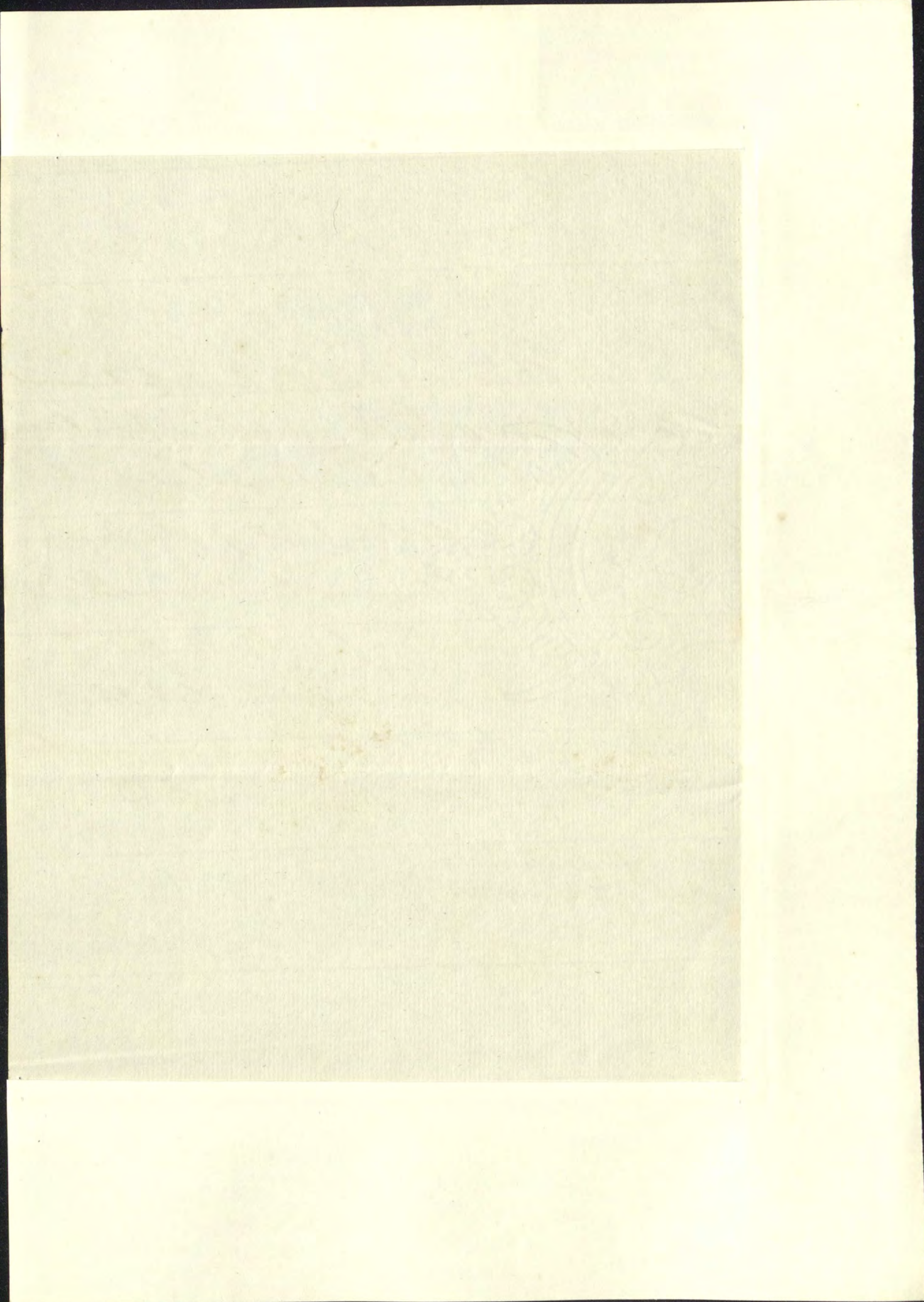

Lord St. Vincent has the honor of transmitting to your Majesty, the minutes and sentences of a Court Martial assembled at the Gore, for the trial of Jacob Godfrey one of the Seamen belonging to your Majesty's late Ship the *Albion* taken possession of by the *Caen* a few months ago and carried into Malaga - This man took so active a part in the mutiny on board of that vessel, that Lord St. Vincent feels no difficulty in humbly submitting to your Majesty, the propriety of ordering the sentence of death passed upon him to be carried into immediate execution.

The proceedings of the Court Martial on the mutineers of the *Termeraire* of yesterday, have been received this morning and will be transmitted to your Majesty in the course of the day.

Your Majesty will perceive by the enclosed private
letter, that the Evidence had been closed, and that the
Court intended to proceed this morning to a consideration
of the Sentence, which when received will immediately
be sent to Your Majesty; in the mean while, the
Board intend to enter into a full and deliberate
consideration of the Evidence, that it may be able
the more readily to submit their opinion, on the
different cases, when the Sentence shall reach them.

The letter from Vice Admiral Mitchell
which is in the Box, a profuse of the reading
of the Crews of the Formidable and Majestic to
proceed to any part of the World was received
at midnight; from these communications, it would
appear, that the Crews of those Ships begin to
feel a proper sense of their duty, but it is also to be
observed, that if the restriction laid on their communication
with the Shore was to be taken off, which they probably
may have supposed this act of submission might

the Queen's Treasury, and of Sums for-
warded to answer Her Majesty's Emergencies,
for which she has declined being trouble-
some about the Interest since one Payment
that was made of it which is mentioned
in the enclosed Particulars; but she has
regularly paid the Interest of the Money
borrowed, and advanced on Her Majesty's
Promissory Notes, and never meant
to mention it till it suited Her Majesty to
pay the Principal as well as the Interest.
Lord Ailesbury was unwilling to detain Lady
Ailesbury, as she was going to the Queen's
House, which occasioned his writing to
take Notice in his last Letter if Her Majesty's
