Sir

I have the honor to report to your Majesty that I have had this morning a conference with Mr Addington and Lord Hobart upon the Peace Establishment of the Army, and after a full discussion I have drawn up the enclosed Plan, in which they have concurred and which I beg leave to lay before your Majesty for your approbation.

Your Majesty will remark that no alteration is proposed to be made in this plan in either the number or the strength of the Regiments of Cavalry from the one last laid before you.

With regard to the Infantry, Mr Addington being anxious for the Reduction of the 90, 91, 92 Regiments and the Scotch Brigade, I represented as strongly as I could the reduction it would make in the numbers, and the necessity if these Corps were to be reduced of augmenting the Rank and file in each Battalion in order to make up for the deficiency,

proposing at the same time to reduce the whole  
of the Grenadiers, which gave it to always in Your  
Majesty's power to call out at a moments warning  
upon any emergency, in order to make that augmentation  
the larger, which was agreed to, and it is settled to  
add fifty men per Battalion.

It is also proposed to keep up at least for the  
present the Black Corps, and the Regiments of  
Pell, Stuart and Maun, the Captains of  
then Regiments, obliging Great Britain to pay them  
for ten years longer,

M<sup>r</sup> Addington has likewise agreed to continue  
the second ~~Second~~ ~~Officers~~ as supernumeraries, and  
in consequence of the Infantry being at 750 Rank  
and full per Battalion to continue the second  
Major, upon the Establishment

In the Cavalry as the second (Field) Officers become  
vacant, the Regiments will be reduced to their  
usual number.
