On consideration of the letters
received early this morning from Lord
Garnett it is humbly submitted to
Your Majesty that Lord Garnett
should be instructed to decline all
proposals of indemnifying Your Majesty
or Your Allies for the expense of Sicily
to France, by the acquisition of States
a Crown in the North of Germany -

such acquisition not being consistent
with the principles on which your
Majesty acts. and that Lord Garmont
should recall the French Government
to the Basis on which alone the negotiation
was opened, in which treaty was by
express declaration included, and
with which its surrender could be wholly
inconsistent: and if he should find
this impossible that he should then
return to England expressing in
terms

terms perfectly civil but at the same
time quite determined that he is
not at liberty to treat on any other
basis than that already established.

It is also submitted that
a reinforcement of six thousand men
should immediately be sent to Sicily

Lord Howick has the honor of acknowledging
for your Majesty's information, dispatches
received yesterday from R. Adm. J. Alexander
Cochrane, for the consideration of which
there has not yet been an opportunity
of presenting your Majesty's confidential
servants.

The Elephant sailed from Portsmouth

with a convoy for the W. Indies on the 4th of
May & would probably join S. C. Cochrane within
a few days after the date of his last dispatch.
Measures have also been taken to supply the
H. M. S. with some additional regiments, & the
orders given to S. R. Shachan & S. J. Probert,
the latter of whom, if he did not receive intelli-
gence of Admiral Willamers' Squadron having
taken some other direction, was to proceed

It is humbly submitted
to Your Majesty, on a consideration
of Lord Garmont's late dispatches,
and of the communications from
Count Stroganoff,

That Lord Garmont
should be instructed to declare
that Your Majesty feels insuperable
objections to any proposal for
abandoning Sicily, unless with the
free, and full, consent of His Italian
Majesty,

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Majesty, and in consequence of
such an arrangement as should pro-
vide for that Sovereign a compensa-
tion really satisfactory, both in
point of value, and of security.

That the proposals now offered
with that view are particularly
objectionable. First because Albania
which forms so considerable a
part of the proposed compensation
is a part of the Turkish Empire, the
integrity of which is a principal
object of the policy both of Great-

Britain and Russia. Secondly, because
there appears no hope of forming
such a Power in that quarter as
could either in extent of territory or
Revenue be able to maintain its
Independence, unless France shall
consent to annex to it large addi-
tions

tions in Istria, and in the Venetian States, including if possible Venice itself.

That Lord Garmouth should therefore discuss these points with M. Galleyrand in order to ascertain whether there be any possibility of obtaining such an offer as might be *bonâ fide* sufficient to induce His Sicilian Majesty to accept the proposal. But that he should declare to M. D'Arbri that this law is adopted only in consequence of that Minister having so strongly expressed his wish that Your Majesty's Government might rather temporize with France than break off the negotiation abruptly.

That Lord Garmouth should further explain to M. D'Arbri the great importance which Your Majesty

Majesty

Majesty attaches to the continuing
to continue all measures both of
Peace and War with Russia: and
the little expectation entertained
here that Russia could by any course
of separate Peace obtain any effectual
security for the remaining interests
of Europe, particularly for Sweden,
Germany, Switzerland, or the Porte:
much less that she could so that
was establish a barrier against the
French in Dalmatia or Albania.
And that it is in Your Majesty's
opinion on every account highly im-
portant under these circumstances
that no expectation should be held
out to the Powers of success in any
endeavour to make a separate Peace
with either of the Allies.

It is further humbly

submitted

humbly submitted that instructions should be sent to Rear Admiral Cochrane, highly disapproving of his having taken upon himself, & without instructions, to assist General Miranda by the employment of the ships under his command, and even to conclude a treaty with him. And that he should be directed to take no steps by which His Majesty can be further committed in that enterprise, without fresh orders to that effect, but to adhere as strictly as possible to the directions which he has already received on that subject.
