The Lord Chancellor has the Honor to present his most humble duty to the King, & lays before His Majesty for His Majesty's Royal signature the commission of assistance which becomes necessary to be renewed at present from the absence of the Master of the Rolls in Scotland; as the Judges who are always named by his Majesty to assist the Chancellor in cases of exigency, are named to assist the Chancellor by name & not the Chancellor generally, which makes a new commission necessary when His Majesty is pleased to change the custody of the Great Seal.

Lord Howick humbly begs permission to state  
to your Majesty that he is fully convinced  
of the necessity of providing by the most explicit  
stipulations, in any convention which may be  
concluded with Prussia, for the immediate  
re-establishment of your Majesty's <sup>civil</sup> Govern-  
ment in Hanover, if the Prussian Court should  
again obtain possession of the Electorate. It was  
always Lord Howick's intention, that he has

already explained to Baron Jacobi, to insert  
a distinct article to this effect, & in humbly  
wishing your Majesty's pardon for the omission,  
he further begs permission to state, as the reason  
for his not having expressed this intention in the  
Memorandum which he had the honor of drawing under  
the direction of your Majesty's confidential Secretary,  
that he conceived it to be implied in the proposi-  
tion for taking possession of the Electorate in your  
Majesty's name, & securing it to your Majesty as  
a Peace.
