

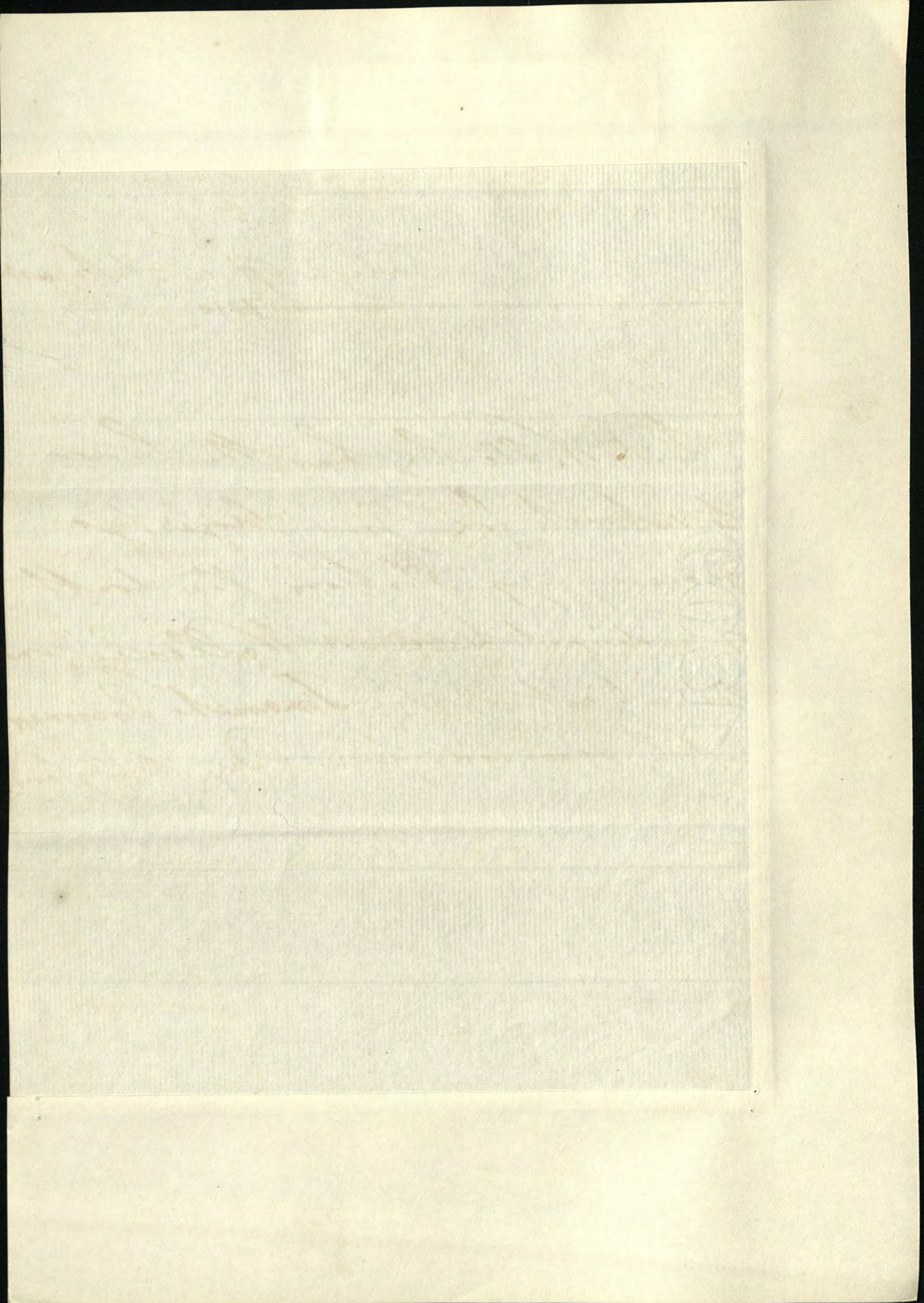

Lord Wellesley has the honor to
acquaint Your Majesty that Captain
Fabian of The Matine, arrived this
morning from Buenos Ayres, brings
intelligence of a revolution at that
^{20th to 23rd May} place, nearly similar to the late
Transactions at the Carnacas. Letters
have been received from the Junta of
Buenos Ayres, addressed to Your Majesty's
Secretary of State for The Foreign
Department, of the same tenor, as those

recently received from the Caracas.
The Manuscript & Printed Papers from
Buenos Ayres are voluminous, & prin-
cipally in the Spanish Language: They
will be forwarded to Your Majesty
as soon as they can be properly prepared.

Lord Wellesley deems it to be his
duty however to submit to Your
Majesty, that the general tenor of
this intelligence strongly confirms the
propriety of the determination, which
Your Majesty has been pleased to
take respecting the Province of
Venezuela.

Majesty's gracious Annuity Office on
17 - Aug. 1820

Mrs Sophia Maria Byron - is the Daughter
of the late Admiral Byron - She is represented to
Mr Percival as being in a very bad State of Health
and in very low Circumstances; and burthened with
the Charge of supporting several orphan Nephews and
Nieces - Mr Percival humbly recommends her
for a Pension of the Hundred & fifty Pounds per Annum. - 156.

Mrs Courtland - aged 65. She is the wife of
Col Courtland who is 71 years old - He is now
the Beneficial Master of Killoham, and enjoys a
Pension from Her Majesty as an American
Soldier of one Hundred Pounds per Annum.
- They have had 23 Children, more of whom
are represented to be still alive - The particular
Circumstance which has brought forward this
application is, that they have recently had the
Charge of 13 Grand Children brought up to them - and

It is held that a Pension of One Hundred
Pounds per Annum net - to Mrs Courtland
would afford them great and substantial
relief - Mr Bernal humbly recommends it - 100

Martinus de Vries - was a Physician at
Walcheren some years ago when your Majesty's
Forces were in that Island under Lord Mulgrave.
Mr. de Vries was upon that occasion very active in
affording them every assistance in his Power, and
when the French came there, and when they understood
the Service he had been of to your Majesty's Subjects, they
deprived him of his Property, & he was obliged to

15488 Mr Tarrant - was Senior Clerk extraordinary of the
Privy Council - He has been a long time resident in the
Country - Upon the Retirement of Sr Stephen (Clerk
Lord Chamberlain) ascertained from Mr Tarrant himself
that his habits of life rendered him wholly incom-
petent to discharge the duties of the Office of Clerk
in ordinary - Had the new arrangement not
taken place in your Majesty's Privy Council Office
whereby the Number of the Clerks in ordinary, and the
same Indulgence ~~had~~ been granted to Mr Tarrant
which has been to some of his Predecessors, and which
therefore he might not very unreasonably have
expected, he might have been enabled to make
an arrangement with his Brother Clerks in ordinary,
by which, leaving them to discharge his Duty, he might
have secured to himself an allowance of something
between two Hundred Pound p^a ann^o - Perhaps
your Majesty will be graciously pleased to think
that under these Circumstances, it will be little
more than an act of Justice to Mr Tarrant to
grant him a pension to that amount -

The Concordation Fund of Ireland - This Fund
has been by a late regulation strictly reserved for such
objects of Charity as had no other income - and
such as her Ladyship's Income is this regulation

only recommend the granting to her Ladyship a pension 100

Sir John Deles - has formerly served your Majesty
abroad as a Consul - He has been for many years a
Comdr. of Exchequer Bills - Upon the occasion of the last
sundry of Exchequer Bills, he was indiscreet enough to give
some special accommodation to some of his acquaintances
and friends, which, tho' not so intended by him, had in fact
an injurious operation upon the interests of other persons who
wanted to fund their - It made a considerable noise at the
time & required a special act of Parliament to set it right -
- A Committee of the Ho of Co. was appointed to enquire
into the circumstances; and altho' they do not report any
thing against the integrity of S. J. Deles, or impute any
corrupt motive to him, yet they report very strongly against
his irregularity, - Mr Brevint thinks it would be highly
injurious to the Character of your Majesty's service to attempt
to support S. J. Deles in his situation after such conduct, and
he has therefore recommended to the Treasury to remove him - But
not being any reason to suspect him of any corrupt motive,
and believing that his removal in his advanced age & declining
health will be extremely inconvenient to him, Mr Brevint
