dressing, a Letter to my Address, directing me to present what Letters or Dispatches I should be charg'd with, to Mons^r de Humber, who had received Orders to remit them into your Majesty's Hands. This Direction I shall punctually comply with.

To attempt minutely to explain to Your Majesty the Reasons, which have induced the Danish Nobility to send me back this second time, would be equally unnecessary & unjudicious; as the Letter which they have themselves drawn up, & addressed to Your Majesty, exactly point them out — but may I be permitted in the most respectful manner to say, that the Party humbly presume to flatter themselves, that Your Majesty may graciously be pleased to admit me to Your Royal Presence, as they think from the repeated Audiences her Majesty, the Queen of Denmark has condescended to grant me, superadded to the Interviews I have had with most of the chief Persons engaged in this Attempt, and the peculiar Instructions I have received from them, I must be more Master of the Genius and Intentions of the Actors, and more capable of answering any Objections or Scruples your Majesty may have, than

can

can possibly be done thro' the Medium of Letters, or of any third Person. — This flattering Hope for They do not presume to request it in express terms — They however submit most respectfully to Your Majesty's Pleasure and Royal Judgment, to which they will ever cheerfully and implicitly resign themselves.
