It may be, that His Royal Highness has advisers ignorant enough to suppose that your Majesty cannot restrain His going abroad, or wicked enough to suggest, that the means of doing so will not be thought fit to be adopted. But your Majesty will not be persuaded to believe this easily; or on slight grounds.

For the rest; as the Chancellor
does not yet know Your Majesty's
Reasons for seeing this scheme in
so disagreeable a light, He does
not presume to offer His thoughts,
till He shall have the Honour of
waiting upon Your Majesty on
Wednesday.
