The Lord Chancellor, with every
Sentiment of humble Duty to
Your Royal Highness The Prince
Regent, takes Leave to state
that, according to the Intention,
which he ventured to mention to
Your Royal Highness on Friday, he
has been at Windsor to day. When
he arrived there, he found that Her
Majesty, and one of the Princesses were
with the King: those of the Physicians,
whom he saw, assured him that his

His Majesty had made very great Progress
towards Recovery in the last four
or five days: and the Chancellor
humbly assures your Royal Highness
that every Thing, that passed in his
Subsequent Interviews with the King,
comprised that Assurance: the
particulars he will not fail to
state faithfully to your Royal
Highness, when he has the Honour
of approaching your Presence. The
Interview was too long: but the
Chancellor was afraid of terminating
it by his own Act: he finally did
so: and his Majesty was pleas'd

to dismiss him with all the dignity,
which has mark'd his Royal
Demeanour in his best Health.

The Chancellor has presumed to
think that your Royal Highness
will pardon his intruding upon
your Royal Highness this Evening,
instead of waiting till to-morrow,
to mention two Circumstances,
without entering into detail.

His Majesty mention'd with a
Reserve & delicacy; what, if the
Chancellor had been ignorant of
what had pass'd, could not have
enabl'd him to know what his Majesty

attended to, that he had received some
Information as to Prince Amelia's
sick, which much affected him. The
Chancellor thought it right, with
Explanations, to state to His Majesty
that he knew what he was pleased to
allude to: and the Chancellor confidently
hopes that that disturbing business
will not produce the Evils, that were
apprehended. As to F., his Majesty's
present feelings are exactly what the
Prince Regent would wish them to be.

The Chancellor did not fail to
endeavour to do Justice, as he assured
His Majesty he would endeavour to
do Justice, to his Sentiments & Conduct
towards the King. He forbears detail
at present: but his Majesty expressed
himself as more than satisfied for
all that he had ever suffered ^{in his Majesty's} ~~in his Majesty's~~
affection at present manifested so strongly
towards him.
