to Mr. Brewster that, as that Quarter had been
closed before the commencement of your Royal
Highness's Regency, and also had commenced while
Col. Taylor was for some portion of it in actual
attendance upon His Majesty, there could be
no question upon the propriety of ~~making~~ good
the Payments for that Quarter - But the
Quarter from the 5th of Jan. to the 5th of April
stands under very different circumstances -
and Mr. Brewster therefore could not
transmit this Warrant without ^{wishing} specially to
draw the attention of your Royal

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Highness to the peculiar circumstances of it -
Mr. Brewster ~~is~~ from intending to suggest
any objection to it, if your Royal Highness should
be graciously pleased to grant it - But as there
is no special provision made in the Regency act
for its continuance, and as its continuance
will therefore depend entirely upon your Royal
Highness's gracious pleasure (if it should be
continued) Mr. Brewster would submit to your
Royal Highness that in the event of your Royal
Highness thinking proper to continue it, Mr. Brewster
will hope to be permitted to acquaint Col. Taylor
that it has been so done by your Royal
Highness's special direction, after your
attention had been particularly called to
it
