be able to state to him. I enclose
therefore, from a Crowd of very
honorable Testimonials, on the East
India Company's Records, a little
Slip of Paper which will enable You
to answer satisfactorily His R. H.'s
Question.

I add to it, a note
from one of the Leading Directors
to myself, in illustration of what
I have said to You in my more
Official Letter on the Subject of the
conduct

of the Govt of Madras. This note is from Mr Thornton, who is well known to the Prince, and I shall thank You to return it to me when done with - A word from His Royal Highness would restore Peace to the Carnatic, and the army, and the Country, would bless him.

Perhaps, if a favorable opportunity should occur, You might favor me by bringing under the Prince's eye, the Book I send. I intend it as a Legacy to my Sons, to animate them to the Love of Science; and on such an occasion I may be pardoned in producing it to my Prince. I am willing to hope, no British Subject ever approached him with a similar Document. This work, which

which (very allowably) I greatly value, I shall thank You to take under your kind care, and return to me when done with.
