I beg Leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, the peculiar Disappointments I have met with in my applications to obtain Promotion in the army. In 1766 I was informed by the Secretary at War That your Majesty had been graciously pleased to appoint me a laptain in the 68. Reg of Foot; but that it was expected that I should exchange with a Captain on half Pay. On my Arrival in Youn, I found both the Commissions made out, and That it was too late for me to hope for the Promotion, unannex'd to this humiliaking Condition. Though I have vince Learn'd, that even this was represented to your Majerly, as what I had desired.

Unwilling to importune your Majesty, I went, by your Majesty's Permission, for some years, into foreign Parts, with a liew to improve myself in the thedy of my Projection. after my Return in 1771 I humbly requested your Majesty's Leave to exchange with L' for Achland, in answer to which I was informed by Lord Bernington that your Majesty would not permit Officers to obtain Preferment from the Halfbay. notwithstanding there were many Precedents for it.

By your Majesty's approbation, signified by Lord Barrington, I purchased a Company in the 22. Mag with the Hopes that your Majasty, would then allow me, to carry my former agreement, with L' fol Achland into Execution. For this I had no opportunity of Addressing muself to your Majerty, as the Regiment was Order of for in mediate derice, and tet out to Join them. I soon after heard, that L'eloil. Achland, had been told, that he must dell to Major

taldwell.

Thus after twelve years, I am, in a lucrative View, in worse Eroumstances, than the first Day I enter o your Majesty's Service, and in Point of Bank, a Captain All my Ancestors have been in the dervice. of their fountry in a military Papacity, and it is my set most Ambition to follow their Example; for the Consideration of all which lircums tances, That your Majesty may be gracious ly pleased to think me worthy of Promotion is the humble Bequest of your Majesty's most dutifull.
