I spoke to Mr Percival yesterday on the subject of the plan of Marylebone Park & he is now disposed to advise the Duke Regent to appoint the D of York to see Lord Glenberrie and yourself together with him (Mr Percival) and in case the Duke should have no strong objection to the general outline of the measure to authorize the immediate commencement of the plantation and roads altho he is still impressed with an idea that even according to your last plan there is not far too great a proportion of buildings - This however may be the subject of future discussion & modification - The Regent is to be at the Treasury holding a Council today & therefore it is not probable that I shall see Mr Percival but it is to be hoped that he will make some arrangement of the above kind to save this season if the D of York should acquiesce I would therefore advise you not to go to Ravenworth Castle on the 16th not actually fix your time for going until we see our way which will be very soon & of which I shall give you due notice - ever your Obedt Servant

P.S.

I will thank you to let Mr R.H. know the contents of this letter but no one else if they soon reducing the buildings they will fritter the revenue to nothing - and spoil the idea of building town residence with the Country & it will be a repetition only of Hampstead & Highgate or a new Clapham common - it is the classical blending of House & scenery - (necessary where well done) that the grandeur and beauty of whole will depend
