

Question to H.M.'s Physicians & their replies

A copy of the Question submitted by Her Majesty's Council to Dr. Gross, and Dr. Sumner, and of their respective answers.

2. Have you had time and opportunity sufficient to inform yourself fully of His Majesty's present habits, demeanour and condition both of body and mind so as to judge of the nature and extent of the disorder under which H. M. labours, and to enable you to report to the Queen's Council whether any and what alteration of treatment in your opinion is likely to produce any beneficial change in His Majesty's condition.

Ans^r. I do not conceive that the time and opportunity have been sufficient for me to make up my mind in a complete and decided manner respecting the

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complaints under which H. M. labours; but I am enabled to report to the Queen's Council that some attention of medical treatment has been suggested, which has had the concurrence of His Majesty's Physicians, and which I hope may tend to produce some beneficial alteration in His M^y: condition.

During each of the three weeks in which I have had the honor to visit His Majesty I have had occasion to observe some variation in His symptoms, and I have not yet had sufficient time and

opportunity to inform myself fully of the extent of the disorder under which His Majesty labours; and with respect to treatment I have leave to report to the Queen's Council that some little attention in the remedies prescribed has this day been suggested to the Physicians in attendance which I hope may produce some beneficial change in His Majesty's condition.
