It would be a particular satisfaction to Lord Liverpool, if Your Royal Highness should be graciously pleased to authorize him, to acquaint Lord Wellington and Gen. Hill that Your Royal Highness would confer the Red Ribbon upon the latter, whenever You might think proper to create any Knights of the Bath.

Lord Liverpool has been to add, that Gen. Newport (who is a Junior Officer in the Majesty's Service) is already a Knight of the Red Ribbon, and Lord Liverpool is

not aware of any Gen. Officer in Service not already in the possession of this Honour who has as strong and peculiar claim

to such a mark of Distinction as Gen. Hill, with the exception of Gen. Graham, to whom Your Royal Highness was so good as to promise the same Honour after the Battle of Barrosa.

Lord Liverpool has great satisfaction in transmitting to Your Royal Highness a letter which he has received this day from d<sup>r</sup> M. Green which gives a very favourable account of the state of the War in the Province of Catalonia.
