Lord Muskerry's wish to see his Royal  
Highness the Prince Regent, is to assure his  
Royal Highness of his unalterable & firm  
Loyalty & Attachment to his Royal Highness's

ago when the Irish Parliament appointed his  
Royal Highness Regent of Ireland that he voted  
in the House of Lords of Ireland for the

the then Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, the present  
Marquis of Buckingham, offered Lord Muskerry  
very good terms to have voted otherwise, which  
Lord Muskerry declined and has ever since been  
neglected by the Government of Ireland - Lord  
Muskerry wishes also to mention to his Royal  
Highness that about seven months ago before  
he came over to England with his Regiment  
that Lord Longueville Dyed, one of the Irish

Irish Representative Peers, that he was applied  
to by the Duke of Richmond to vote for Lord  
Gosport to succeed him, which he should have done,  
but that he had Letters from the Lords Castlemont  
& Donoughmore & a Verbal communication with Mr.  
Bower Daly, assuring him that his Royal Highness  
would be obliged to him, to vote for Lord Leitrim,  
who he was much interested for, so devoted for  
Lord Leitrim, which the Duke of Richmond was  
not pleased at - Lord Muskerry wishes also to  
mention to his Royal Highness, what is most  
unpleasant to him, which is, that the Lord  
Muskerry's son will have a very large Fortune,  
yet that Lord Muskerry's Affairs have been &  
are very much Embarrassed, so much so that he  
is really Distressed, and if his Royal Highness  
could do something for him in Ireland, his Royal  
Highness would do a most gracious kind act by  
him -
