My Dear Colonel

I have had the pleasure of receiving your letter of the 3^d, together with the very interesting Papers which accompanied it. No man in the Kingdom can lament more than I do the very disagreeable situation in which H: R: H: is placed by the conduct of the different Parties; and perhaps it might have been as well if H: R: H: had determined at once, to keep in the late Ministers, and depose the Parliament. But such was not his course, and he must answer for it. He has done a mischief to his Country, far beyond any thing, which any attempt of Bonaparte's could have effected. Most truly and most sincerely do I sympathize with the Prince Regent's feelings. What must these be, if H: R: H: is down to the necessity of taking those into his Councils, who basely, & most ungratefully, deserted him, & the Royalist when he stood in the greatest need of them? He never can have any regard for, or confidence in Persons, who have proved to him, that their attachment to H: R: H: was of the most selfish & sordid, and only continued, so long as it was their interest, and yet at the very moment when he deserted him in the most dangerous & critical hours, they are still unwilling to return, and perhaps fear the same attachment again, whenever their interest & ambition lead them to suppose they shall be greatly benefited by so doing. Even the two noble Doms are not unwilling to accept of office, provided H: R: H: will consent to their having all the Power, and submit himself to their Will, and Pleasure. Should the Prince Regent's generosity sake his consent to overlook such unpardonable ingratitude, and indigities, as he has set forth from

Mons, from whom He has an undoubt'd right to expect a very different action
for the great Partiality, with which he has honored them, I am certain at
least He can never in his heart forgive them; such loss forst the Treatment
He has received from them. What Security can H: R: H: have, if such however
be become his heirs, that they will not desert him again, whenever they think
it for their Advantage to do so. H: R: H: knows by Experience, that no Kindred,
or even affection on his part, can bind them to him; and therefore I hope He will
make the proper use of them, & keep them in, or have them out, just as it suits
His convenience at any time; for it is absolutely impossible that they can ever again
enjoy his Confidence, or good Opinion. It is impossible for any body to have shown
more Nobility of mind, or more true Patriotism, than the Prince Regent has done,
in his Attempts to form a strong, & powerfull Administration. He has ever offered to
sacrifice his own private feelings, to what has been thought, the good of the Publick
if he has not succeeded it has not been his fault, & the impenitent, and
thinking part of the Kingdom, and even during his Conduct, & feel the Obligations
they owe him, upon this Occasion. I beg you will present my most dutifull
expressions of continued attachment to His Royal Person, & the Happiness I shall
feel, if I can in any way be made usefull. keep thyself of the Conventions
and best wishes of the Duke, himself, & all thy family, & offer the same for us to H: R:
