may recollect the circumstance, but any reference to the  
other Lady would be known instantly to have come  
thru me — As to the visits to the Theatre their fre-  
quency to the same performance & her particular

conversation of the Green Room it was remarked on  
evenings that he did not accompany her that  
her eyes
