My Dear Sir,

Such an effort at this time will impose upon me the most grateful and permanent recollection.

In the hope and belief that my request — submitted only at the utmost extremity of danger — will be complied with, I pledge my self never again to make any application of a pecuniary nature for any services, and to cancel at once any reference whatever to the annuity which was several years regularly paid.
