My Dear Sir

It happens that at the present moment
there are two places vacant, either of which would call
forth my active services, and the one a Commissioner of
the Navy vacant by the Death of Mr Spambier, the other an
Auditor of the Public accounts vacant by the Death
of Mr Dore, either of these offices I submit I am peculiarly
suited for, and to which I should be most happy to give
my most zealous attention, If the Prince Regent could
now be graciously pleased to mention this circumstance
to Lord Liverpool His ^{Royal Highness} ~~Excellency~~ would do all that I can
wish. He had rather have the honor to fill some
office of less Envolvement about His Royal Person
or that of his immediate family, and I would take
the liberty to mention that as my Intimate family
have ever both in and out of Parliament given their
ready support to His Lordships Administration and that

of his friends, and that I actually gave up my strong
 pretensions to the Representation of the City in Parliament
 for the sake of Peace, and that Mr Wood and Mr
 Waitman might be kept out of Parliament,
 without wrying any other of my humble pretensions
 to be now noticed, I am led to think that
 Lord Liverpool might not object to the
 appointment in a Ministerial point of view,
 if it were suggested to him, I will not detain
 you with a longer letter but merely suggest
 to your consideration these vacancies and begging
 you to talk with Col Mackintosh on the subject
 (who I will not trouble with a letter) that I
 may through you exert myself and not be
 suffered to rest on my Knives any longer
