My dear Sir

If there be any thing  
that I labor beyond all others  
it is the yielding to the pressing  
demands of necessity & asking for  
assistance - The parent of all his  
Majesty's subjects has all prepared  
to sustain a loss of £50 last autumn  
in an election pamphlet written  
of set by the command, & with  
the approbation of the President, who  
when the service was performed  
rejoiced even the expenses I had been  
at. Had he not been the Minister  
of Affairs, the P.R. should not have  
blended set down with it

You know the Pamphlet  
I lately wrote & thinking it would  
be the cause of Justice I was  
at a very great expense gained  
the necessary information for

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incurring in any way that may  
be deemed expedient for this purpose  
I have said to Lord Sidmouth  
to request an interview in order  
to communicate what I have  
learned, feeling with you that  
it would be very improper for  
you to interfere in it.

Well, for the pamphlet I  
before I have received it from  
the Bookellers my Printer has  
followed paper me for the money  
I know his necessities & my own  
inability - I do not ask for any  
remuneration for their labours  
or expense - when my services are  
completed they will be duly  
appreciated but in the mean time  
I am at the lowest ebb of distress  
I suffer many privations &  
continually living in hope but

until I get my money from the  
Bookellers I am in great distress  
to pay my Printer - I have exhausted  
every means & I am truly pained  
to say that on you, or whom I have  
no claim but for my reason I  
can rely - To say I will repay  
it in a month or six weeks cannot  
I have tonight having perfected  
the character of punctuality I  
will therefore rely on you - You know  
my situation, you know my  
intelligence & you know the proper  
of payment by me & I must leave it  
entirely to your own generous  
heart to decide - I may add that I  
am sanguine enough to hope that  
my exertions will afford me the  
means of clearing off all I owe  
I shall renew the printer of  
the pamphlet in about two  
months & I think I had better  
send you my draft at that

date which if paid into your  
Bankers shall be duly honored

I shall send as I learn tomorrow  
for your remittance which if favored  
will relieve me from a heavy load  
& shall be most gratefully  
acknowledged in every way  
by Dear Sir
