Family & me, & I hope my public
& private conduct have never
disclosed an ingratitude to it, but
this instance of His Royal Highness's

of gratitude & thanks — The Boy has
been adopted by me from his earliest
youth, and there is nothing on earth
that would have gratified me so
much as the favour which has been
shown him —
