My Dear Doctor,

The peculiar & important crisis has necessarily led to a more continued prospect in relation to me than I could wish, but things wear so promising a complexion & success in the Rolls will so clearly put an end to any further engagement of your exertions on my Account that I am less diffident in urging the subject - Mrs. McMahon has with the greatest good nature & kindness proposed me of the result of your affectionate efforts for me & she talked of November as the probable maturity of the arrangement - I am much disposed to conjecture that Mr. Curran will when it comes to the point flatter & act with indiscretion unless he has already taken some definite step upon the subject - If your time is quite engaged Mrs. McMahon will be so kind to give me information upon the two leading points first whether Lord Liverpool has said yes &

& next whether Mr. C. has seen you or sent in his resignation & if not  
whether any thing is to be done -

I saw Mr. Thos. McMahon & I think you are relieved from any  
further pursuit for him - I suggested to him what he then told  
was the Idea of his friend the Attorney General - "to close the  
"Sales of the property he is selling in the ensuing November -  
"settle with his Creditors & then offer himself as a disengaged  
"Man to Mr. Pult" according to what the Idea in Mr. Pult's Letter  
he was anxious to hear Mr. Pult's Letter - I told him he  
should have the abstract related to himself but that I  
felt I ought to inclose you back the letter, & entre' you, McMahon  
is not a Man of much Sense & therefore perhaps not a fit  
Depository of a private Letter of this kind - I called myself upon  
Mr. Popplethorpe & very anxiously tendered my services if any of  
any Value & Suite of consequence follow it up in any <sup>thing</sup> within my  
Reach for Mr. Williams -
