1812 when I had the honor to send in my  
Poem "Herion" dedicated by permission  
to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent,  
& your Lordships answer of 4<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> following  
in which you were pleased to say that  
you wd take an early opp<sup>t</sup> of laying it  
before His Royal Highness - I presumed  
to state in my letter to the Prince Regent  
the motives & inducements which led  
to my dedication. I also mentioned the
