Louisa-bourne May 5th 1814

My dearest Brother

Though I have troubled you
so often of late with Letters, I cannot deny
myself the pleasure of sending you a few lines
by Adolphus, which I hope will prove the great
satisfaction I ever feel to converse with you.
Much do I wish dearest Brother that all
circumstances had united to allow of its being
by word of mouth, however I shall look
forward with impatience to a more favourable
moment, in which I shall have the happiness
to pay you a visit, and thank you for the
kindness you have shown me on all occasions.
Hearing that both the Emperor of Russia, and
King of Prussia, are to spend some weeks in
England, I take the liberty to renew my
dearest Brother my request, that you will
bore the goodness to speak in behalf of the

King's interests and mine, to the Emperor of
 Russia, who seems now to be very well inclined
 to favour his Uncle; if you will deign to
 have the kindness to express yourself affectionately
 concerning me, and to speak with regard of
 the King. A word from you will be of great
 consequence at this important Crisis, in which
 the fate of all Sovereigns must be finally
 decided. The King places great confidence in
 your friendship which he is convinced will
 be of essential service to him, and his family;
 he desires me to present his Compliments.

I am anxious to hear how the Prince Royal
 of Winttemberg will please you, he has had
 the good fortune to gain the good will of
 the whole allied Army, by the manner in
 which he has distinguished himself on all
 occasions, and by his sensible, modest behaviour.
