On Tuesday the 12<sup>th</sup> July while standing by the Opera House, accompanied by my Wife, we perceived Her Royal Highness The Princess Charlotte, running in the middle of the road, from Warwick Street, to the Opera House, Her Royal Highness was extremely agitated, and hurriedly entered the Coach Stand, before the said House, opened the door of the Hackney Coach No. 1056. pulled down the Steps, and immediately entered it, and directed the Coachman to drive on immediately, conceiving from the apparent alarming and singular Situation, of her Royal Highness, that it was my Duty to prevent any Evil, she might be liable to in such a Situation, I silently followed the Coach until it arrived at Connaught place, when being apprised of the Intention, and Safety of Her Royal Highness, I returned through Bond Street, and requested Mr. Weston (residing there) of the Post Office, conceiving he would communicate them to

but, as I believe concerned, I might be

Pelisse, and a small white Cottage  
Bonnet; on her Road Her Royal High-  
ness stopped once, and pulled the Blind  
on one side the Coach, and attempted to  
do the same on the other side, but there  
was no Blind; the Name of the Coach-  
man was Higgins. I did not attempt
