The Lords Commissioners of  
His Majesty's Treasury &c &c  
The Memoriel of Mary Campbell  
Widow of the late Lt. General Colin Campbell  
Lt. Governor & Comd. in Chief of the Army of Gibraltar.  
Sheweth,

That your Memorialist, the  
Daughter of the late Colonel Guy Johnson,  
who succeeded his Father in Law, the  
late Sir William Johnson in 1774 - as  
his Majesty's Sole Agent & Superintendent  
of Indian Six Nations & their Confederates,  
in North America, & Colonel of the same.

Was, Coheirss, with her Sister, to the  
said Colonel Guy Johnson's property.

That owing to the Loyalty of your  
Memorialist's Father, his Estate, & a  
valuable one, bequeathed to him, by  
his Father in Law, Sir William Johnson,  
were forfeited -

That the said property, moderately  
valued, at that time, was estimated  
at upwards of Thirty Thousand pounds  
the lands being mostly cultivated,  
amounting to nearly Eighty Thousand  
acres - Situated in the fine Province  
of New York -

That many years after the

decease, of the said Colonel Guy Johnson, his Daughters, received, only, the small compensation of, five thousand, three hundred, & seventy three pounds.

That, owing to the very strong attachment of the Indians to the Family of Johnson, and their treating with Contempt the Offers of Congress, their blood was attainted - and your Memorialist & her Sister, thereby deprived of the advantages, that other Females enjoyed who were, enabled afterwards to take possession, of lands in the States, that remained unoccupied at the time of the peace -

To indemnify them, for any losses, they might sustain provided they remained -  
New York

That your Memorialist & her Sister, never resorted to the bounty of Government, though the Rank and losses of their Parent, might have warranted such an application

That added to the above losses in the States, your Memorialist's Father, had ten thousand acres of land in Nova Scotia, taken possession of by the Emigrants from New York, for which Government promised a Compensation, of other lands, which have never been obtained.

That the afflictive loss of your Memorialist's  
Husband, the late Lt. General Campbell,  
induces her, to bring forward, her own  
Claims, in justice to her Children -  
Seven of whom - are still unprovided for  
and four of them Daughters -

Your Memorialist therefore  
Ardently trusts, that your Lordships,  
may be pleased to take her case, into  
consideration, and that the lapse of  
years, previous to its being brought  
forward, may not be deemed a bar,  
to a Claim, which she trusts, the  
Liberality of Government, may not  
consider, as infringing on its justice,  
and that your Lordships, may  
graciously recommend, such  
remuneration to be made to your  
Memorialist, as your Lordships  
in your Wisdom, may think fit.
