Ld. Liverpool has had the Honour of waiting
upon Her Majesty, in obedience to your Royal
Highness's Commands, and stated to Her
Majesty, as Respectfully, but at the same time
as fully, and distinctly, as he was able the
many Inconveniences, which might arise
from the Relation in which the Duke
of Cumberland would stand towards Her Majesty
and other Parts of the Royal Family, in consequence
of the Letter which Her Majesty had addressed
to his Royal Highness and how desirable it
was on every Account that this Letter
should in some ^{way} or other be cancelled,
especially as Her Majesty's main object,
might be secured, without the necessity
of any such Letter being in existence.

The Duke was graciously pleased to listen
with

with attention, to every thing which was
expressed by Lord Liverpool, Her Majesty
has been so good as to promise to give to
the subject a further consideration, but
Lord Liverpool would not be warranted
in holding out any expectations to your
Royal Highness that the result of such
consideration would be favourable to your
Royal Highness's wishes.

Lord Liverpool would however humbly
suggest, that much advantage might arise,
from your Royal Highness writing to
Her Majesty, that "It was your Royal Highness's
intention, to prevent as far as might be
practicable, the Duchess of Cumberland coming
to England, under the present circumstances,
and that in the event of the Royal Highness
coming ^{to the country} your Royal Highness would not
presume or solicit the Queen to receive her,

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if it should be then, contrary to the intention
of the Duke, that therefore your Royal
Highness hoped, that the Duke would
allow the Duke of Cumberland to return
the letter which he had received from
the Duke, in order to relieve him from
the difficulties in which the existence
of such a letter must place him.
